...I asked her about the impact the scholarship had for her [and] she wrote this note that helps me appreciate the range of global and local networks and issues in which she engages with concrete implications at community, national and international levels:

Dear Nancy,

Below is how I feel about Rotary and the impact on me.

Rotary has been instrumental in my life - the scholarship allowed me to pursue my studies in economics and public policy at the London School of Economics. Since then I've contributed to policy research on anti-corruption at the OECD, applied my social sciences background in the technology sphere by helping to design approaches to detect misinformation online, and led research and design of collective intelligence solutions for crisis situations.

Today I work at the intersection of art and technology by crafting how we tell stories, while pursuing projects on the side - from creating short films to designing board games in order to explore different mediums for storytelling.

To Rotary, I express my deepest gratitude for being an inspiration when it comes to a life of service and also for the community of some of the kindest people and mentors in my life...and the many people I've met in New York and in the various Rotary Clubs in the UK.

It would be great to have her present again at a District event!

And in another message, she gave her assessment of Rotary: What I love about Rotary is the values, and being part of the scholarship programme and visiting the various clubs [where] you get to see how each club instills those values, and then you think about how you can do that too as you interact with the world.

Bainbridge Rotary

The Bainbridge Rotary Club, through a District Community Grant, partnered with the Jericho Garden Club of Bainbridge, B-G Central School, Chenango County Cooperative Extension, and the Bainbridge Lions Club to build a beautiful garden shed at the Community Gardens. In a second Community Grant the Bainbridge Rotary Club partnered with the same organizations to build additional raised beds on the property, as well as on the elementary school grounds.



This was an intergenerational project, which included children, parents and grandparents who helped with building the sheds, planting the beds, and harvesting the produce for use in their own homes. Children were taught how to preserve their harvest with classes in canning and freezing and each went home with their finished products. The projects have been sustained as old beds have been rebuilt, new beds have been built, students have planted their beds each year and harvested their produce for use in the school cafeteria.

This grant has been a lifelong learning experience for our B-G students and their families.



Ithaca Nonprofit Receives Rotary Grant for Gender Equity Project in South Sudan

At the Abukloi High School, located in the city of Rumbek, South Sudan, 175 girls collectively miss over 1,000 days of school each month because their families cannot afford to buy them menstrual hygiene supplies.

Thanks to a \$4,750 grant from The Rotary Foundation, this is about to change.

Through the efforts of Gertrude Noden, a member of the Rotary Club of Ithaca and founder of a not-for-profit called <u>Words Into Deeds</u>, the Abukloi students have received sewing machines, materials, and training with the goal of producting 600 reusable feminine hygiene kits a year. The grant also supports lessons in gender equity, reproductive health and business planning.

"To level the playing field at this school, we need to provide feminine reusable kits that are environmentally friendly and to teach the girls how to use them so they can attend classes every day of the month," Noden said.

Each kit costs \$4 to produce and will last for the length of the school year. Once the needs of Abukloi students are met, kits will be made available to schools in surrounding villages and sold at the local market.

Funding for this grant comes from The Rotary Foundation, Rotary's charitable arm, which approved the project based on the recommendation of Rotary District 7170, which includes Tompkins and six other counties in Central New York.

The grant builds upon the success of a previous Ithaca Rotary award that Noden used to establish a sewing salon in Gulu, Northern Uganda. Launched in 2022, this facility provides young mothers with 6-months of training in all aspects of textile design and production accompanied with psychosocial counselling and lessons in business management.

To date, 30 young women have been trained, and have formed a licensed company in Gulu that is producing clothing, backpacks, dolls and sandals in addition to feminine hygiene kits.

The 2022 award of \$12,000 from the International Service Committee of the Rotary Club of Ithaca was not only instrumental in launching the program but also in obtaining additional funds from private donors to Words Into Deeds that have supported its expansion.

"Gertrude has been innovative in leveraging support to build entrepreneurial and educational initiatives that benefit women, girls, their families and communities," said Nancy Potter, cochair of the Ithaca Rotary's International Service Committee.

Rotary's motto is "Service Above Self" and membership in the Ithaca Rotary Club is open to all community members who share in this belief. Ithaca Rotary gathers every Wednesday at 12 p.m. for luncheon meetings at Coltivare, 235 South Cayuga St. in Ithaca. The public is invited to attend the weekly meetings and can learn more about Ithaca Rotary at https://ithacarotary.com/.
