CNY Rotary Nominations Now Open



Nominations Now Open for CNY Rotary Leadership Positions The CNY Rotary Steering Committee has opened up nominations for several leadership roles on the future team and all qualified members of Districts 7150, 7170 and 7190 are encouraged to put their name in the hat. All submissions will go through the CNY Rotary Nominating committee, which is comprised of

the three Immediate Past District Governors (who cast one vote in the case of a tie), the three District Governor Elects, three Assistant Governors, three immediate Past Club Presidents, three Past District Governors and the three sitting District Governors are non-voting members. You can see that there are three of each position, with one hailing from each of our current three districts.

CNY Rotary President (formerly known as District Governor) We are seeking nominations for the President of CNY Rotary for 2025-26 and this can happen one of three ways:

- 1 Your club can nominate you (with your approval)
- 2 You can go to your club to ask them to nominate you
- 3 The nominating committee can nominate someone directly (with their approval)

The basic qualifications for the role are that you must have been an active member for at least seven years before your term begins and you have to have served a full year as club president. Details on the nominating process, a job description, and answers to Frequently Asked Questions about being President, as well as the necessary forms are all available at www.cnyrotary.org under the Nominations tab. If you are considering this position, you can reach out to anyone on the Steering Committee to discuss if it would be a good fit for you. It is a serious leadership position, and you should know what it will entail before stepping up. It will also be a seriously rewarding experience!

CNY Rotary Committee Chairs Several committee chair positions are also open to nominations during this time: Finance, Foundation, Youth Exchange, Public Image, Membership, Training, and Diversity, Equity and Inclusion. Each of these roles require some Rotary experience in that area of expertise and come with opportunities for additional training. For these positions, you can self-nominate or have someone nominate you. Please do not nominate people without their permission. The nominating committee will be going through all submissions for these roles, with the top candidates to be interviewed by the CNY Rotary Steering Committee later this month. Check out the Nominations tab at www.cnyrotary.org for job descriptions and the online form for nominations.

Nomination Deadline is May 15 The deadline for clubs to nominate a CNY Rotary President or for someone to nominate themselves to a chair position will be Monday, May 15th. This is because the goal is to have all positions filled by the start of the new Rotary year. This gives the new volunteer leaders time to plan for attending training in the fall and to start work on building the rest of the committee. Each committee will now be bigger and that means many more opportunities to serve. If none of the roles described here sound like you, but you know you want to help at the district level, please keep following along because the call for you to get involved will be going out in the next phase.

Please be sure to <u>follow us on Facebook</u> and/or Instagram as we put out reminders and helpful information about the work being done to become CNY Rotary. Our goal is that people feel informed and have plenty of opportunities to engage, ask questions and get involved.

[Thirty-eight] highway cleanup volunteers collected trash in 69 bags at the semi-annual Rt 13 Highway Cleanup sponsored by Ithaca Noon and Ithaca Sunrise on Earth Day! Rotarians were joined by members of the Cornell Rotaract Club, DG Rocky Martinez, an Ithaca College student interested in starting a Rotaract Club, a youth exchange student, community volunteers and members of local organization Zero Waste Ithaca.



Rotarians Chris Haase and Heidi Goldstein coordinated the check-in station and Rotarians Jeff True and Jim Johnston drove up and down the road for almost three hours, handing out bags, water, good cheer, and providing an extra eye toward safety. Rotarian Joanne Lamoureux provided homemade muffins and drinks that disappeared faster than the trash.



The very successful cleanup started with words of motivation from Liz Kreitinger, Watershed Steward and Executive Director of Cayuga Lake Watershed Network, who reminded us that roadside ditches and drainages are waterways, and that our positive impact on the road has a direct benefit to the quality of Cayuga Lake. The Cayuga Lake Watershed Network has been collaborating with community groups to keep our waterways clean since 2009. The 870-square-mile Cayuga Lake watershed extends across Cayuga, Seneca, Tompkins, Schuyler, Tioga, and Cortland counties.

Applications for the 2024 Rotary Peace Fellowships are now available!

You can help promote peace in the world by encouraging peace and development leaders in your community to apply for the Rotary Peace Fellowship.

Each year, Rotary awards fully funded fellowships for peacebuilders from diverse backgrounds to study at one of our peace centers located at premier universities around the world. This year, we'll select 50 peace fellows to study in our master's degree programs and 40 fellows to earn a professional development certificate.

Rotary Peace Fellows use their training to amplify their work at the local, regional, or global level. Clubs and districts can partner with them on peacebuilding initiatives before, during, and after their fellowships.

But we need your help finding candidates. Rotary and Rotaract members can get involved by:

- Taking the <u>All About the Rotary Peace Fellowship</u> course to learn about the qualification criteria, eligibility restrictions, the application process, and more
- Forwarding the <u>fellowship announcement</u> to your contacts and including it in club and district communications
- Using our referral form to tell us about potential candidates so we can contact them
- Sharing a <u>PowerPoint presentation</u> about the fellowships with your club members and community
- Following the Rotary Peace Centers Facebook page and sharing our posts

Candidates have until 15 May to submit applications to The Rotary Foundation.

Thanks to generous support from donors and the dedicated participation of Rotary members, the peace fellowship program has more than 1,600 alumni working to make positive change in more than 140 countries.
