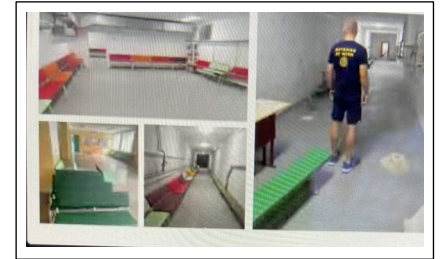

International News

Completed Bomb Shelter in Lviv, Ukraine

The bomb shelter at School #39 in Lviv, Ukraine has been completed and now offers a safe space for 700 students and community members during daily air siren raids. Funding for the renovation of the 800-square-foot basement at the Lviv high school was funded in part by the **Ithaca Rotary Club**, which raised \$31,000 for the project. The club's contribution included a \$25,000 disaster response grant from The Rotary Foundation.



The Ithaca Rotary Club then launched a fundraising campaign that generated another \$9,000 to pay for the renovation of a bomb shelter at a second school in Lviv enrolling nearly 50 children with disabilities and special needs. Ithaca Rotary hosted a benefit concert last February featuring local musicians and artists, which helped raise money for the project.

On Thanksgiving Day, Olexiy Gusev, former president of [Rotary Club Lviv International](#), gave Rotarians from around the world who helped raise money for the high school bomb shelter a video tour of the project. Attending the meeting were Rotarians from Ithaca, the United Kingdom, the Netherlands and Germany. Gusev, who worked with Ithaca Rotary on the project, said when the war is over, the bomb shelter will become a welcoming student and community space.

2024-25 Club Leaders - Save These Dates & Get Prepared to Lead

Happy New Year everyone! With it now officially 2024 on the calendar, it's even more important that club leaders who will take office on July 1 are preparing to lead. A vital part of that prep is attending both the virtual Pre-PETS sessions in February and the in-person MD PETS weekend March 15-17. PETS stands for President Elect Training Seminar. These are courses and learning opportunities designed specifically for our incoming Club Presidents.

Virtual Training

Pre-PETS is designed to cover the nuts and bolts: planning a great meeting, putting together a budget, making sure you have a logo, and reviewing many of the functions of running a club. It's not wildly entertaining, but it's very important stuff to know! We hold these sessions on zoom and they do not require pre-registration. We'll post the zoom link on our website and email it to you for easy access. Please note that the date of the sessions rotates through the days of the week to hopefully make them accessible to all (see graphic for details). The sessions will be recorded in case they are in conflict with your club's meeting, but we encourage all to attend live if you can so you can ask questions and engage.

- No registration necessary
- Learn important basics about running a club

Ithaca Rotary

The Rotary Club of Ithaca has awarded \$10,000 in grants to 11 community nonprofits for projects ranging from cleaning up litter along Cayuga Lake to purchasing an accessible picnic table at a public park.



The Rotary Club received 28 applications this year for its annual Community Grants program. The final projects were selected by a seven-member committee of Rotarians who evaluated the proposals. While the maximum amount of each grant was \$1,000, directors of several nonprofits said they would not have been able to complete their projects without the funding from Ithaca Rotary.

Jan Bridgeford-Smith, executive director of the Women's Opportunity Center, said the \$950 grant her agency received will allow it to run radio ads tying in with a United Nations' campaign to end gender-based violence against women, starting later this month. "This is the first time that we're doing a campaign like this," said Bridgeford-Smith, a member of Ithaca Rotary. "Even though it's not a lot of money, it kind of seals the deal with our ability to create this program."

Ithaca Rotary's Community Grants are intended to promote the quality of life in Tompkins County and the greater Ithaca area. The grants support organizations in the community that have special projects or needs which are not funded by general funding sources. "Our goal is to fully fund a local agency's project," said Kelly Buck, an Ithaca Rotary member who cochairs the program. "The grants are not huge, but they really help our nonprofits meet their mission."

Ithaca Rotary's 2023 grant recipients are:

Brooktondale Community Center Inc. - \$1,000

Construct an awning to protect the center's handicapped ramp and make it safe and accessible in winter.

Cayuga Lake Watershed Network - \$1,000

Extend a litter cleanup program by offering cleanup kits on loan to community groups so that they can pick up trash along the shoreline and waterways in our watershed.

Community Science Institute - \$1,000

Purchase a new printer to produce materials for volunteers and lake monitoring programs as well as educational materials for the public.

Enfield Community Council - \$930

Construct a rainwater irrigation system that will support its community garden.

Family & Children's Services - \$1,000

Purchase a mobile play therapy kit that will expand treatment for all of its clinical offices.

Foodnet Meals on Wheels - \$520

Purchase equipment to aid in the packaging and delivery of food as well as two security cameras to support security at its facility.

Free Science Workshop - \$1,000

Support outreach programming to bring science discovery to area youth.

Jacksonville Community Association - \$1,000

Buy an ADA-compliant picnic table for the Jacksonville park.

The Learning Web - \$1,000

Purchase men's bathing and hygiene supplies and staples for emergency food needs.

Tompkins Learning Partners, Inc. - \$600

Purchase an iPad and digital practice tests for students preparing to take the GED test.

Women's Opportunity Center - \$950

Support local activities to end gender-based violence against women, as part of the United Nations' 16 Days of Activism Campaign
