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As October 10th approaches, I'm hoping each club can find a way to recognize World Mental Health Day. There are many things that we can do: share mental health support messages on social media, have a speaker at your club meeting, host a discussion group or simply reach out to someone you know who might be struggling. Let's keep working towards stopping the stigma surrounding mental health.

Around the world, Rotarians recognize October 24th as World Polio Day. And for years, I've been donating to the Polio Plus campaign as a part of my contributions to the Rotary Foundation. But do you know what the "Plus" stands for? According to the RI website, "The 'plus' is something else that is provided as a part of the polio eradication campaign. It might be a hand-operated tricycle or access to water. It might be additional medical treatment, bed nets, or soap. A 2010 study estimates that vitamin A drops given to children at the same time as the polio vaccine have prevented 1.25 million deaths by decreasing susceptibility to infectious diseases."

Here's a little quiz to see what your Polio IQ is:

- What is the average cost to vaccinate a child?
- What Rotary Club started the Polio immunization campaign?
- What 2 countries continue to have wild polio virus cases?

I'll donate \$1 to the Polio Plus campaign for each correct answer. Just send me an email and let me know how many you got correct. When you factor in the 2:1 match by the Gates Foundation, we can make progress towards eradicating Polio worldwide.

Could you be our CNY Rotary leader for 2026-27?

It is time once again for us to seek nominations for a President of CNY Rotary. Similar to how we found our President Nominee last spring, we'll open up nominations for one month and a candidate must be nominated by their club. But that doesn't mean you have to wait to see if your club asks you! If you are interested and qualified, you can approach your club's president to ask them to take your name to the board and help you complete the nomination form.

To qualify, you will have to have been in Rotary for seven years by the time you take office July 1, 2026. You also must have completed a year as a club president and be an active member in good standing. And you will want to be someone who thrives on meeting new people, enjoys sharing the inspiring word of Rotary, and likes traveling around our beautiful region.

Preparation for becoming President of CNY Rotary will start as soon as the candidate is confirmed with joining the leadership team and attending multiple trainings provided (and paid for) by Rotary International. There will be plenty of time to ramp up your Rotary IQ, work with the CNY Rotary team and hone your leadership skills.

Climate Action Notes

Reduce ... Reduce ... Reduce

To date, these articles have been about ways you, as an individual, can help minimize the coming climate disaster; reduce consumption, educate yourself, join with other Rotarians on projects large and small, but what might you do to have an additional impact? Let me tell you what I did on Sunday, Sep 17th...

The “March to End Fossil Fuels”

That day I arrived at the Wegmans in Ithaca a 6 a.m. to join others for a bus trip to New York City where we join other protestors from many cities in New York State, the eastern US, and around the world. At the end of the day over 70,000 had walked 1.5 miles across Manhattan to rally on 1st Ave between 50th and 55th Streets, near UN headquarters. There, entertainers and activist, including Representative AOC, thanked us for being there and encouraged us to keep up the work. **These 70,000 people took to the streets of New York City on Sunday** to tell President Joe Biden to stop approving fossil fuel projects, phase down oil and gas drilling, declare a climate emergency, and provide a just and equitable transition off fossil fuels.



Sunday's march was all about people power. The march was led by New York grassroots organizations; Black, Indigenous, other communities of color, and frontline communities living next to oil and gas facilities and infrastructure across the world; youth, elders, workers, people of faith, and people of all backgrounds impacted by fossil fuels and climate disaster across the United States. The majority of protestors from Ithaca were associated with the ‘Extinction Rebellion’ while some others (myself included) represented the ‘Sierra Club’, ‘Third Act’, and ‘Citizen Action’.



Massive rallies don’t happen often but there are regional and local events that you can join, support, and maybe even organize. The local Extinction Rebellion group has been protesting every Sat at 11:00 am on the Commons in downtown Ithaca across the street from Chase Bank to put pressure on Chase to stop financing the expansion of the fossil fuel industry.

The top four fossil fuel financing banks, JP Morgan Chase, Citi, Bank of America, and Wells Fargo all pay lip service to climate change initiatives but still finance fossil fuel expansion. When compared to the top 60 global banks, these four banks have contributed more than one quarter of the \$4.6 trillion in total financing for fossil fuels between 2016 and 2021. and educational meet up in Thompson Park, Ithaca. Consider taking your credit card banking elsewhere **AND LET THEM KNOW WHY!**

Everyone needs to take many actions as they can for years to come. Change your own life style, encourage friend and family to join you, pressure your elected officials to do what must be done, Currently humanity has all the technology and understanding of what needs to be done, yet we aren’t showing the...will to do it.

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My Rotary Story: Dryden Rotary, Cathy Wakeman

As firm believers in education, we routinely reminded our four boys of the many learning opportunities surrounding them. For high school, they could learn a trade through BOCES; earn their associate degree through College Now (concurrent enrollment at the local community college); have fun in high school, try all sorts of new things and save the serious academics for college; or travel the world.

Of course, with four boys, they took four different routes. When our third son, Bryan, announced in late August, just before his 15th birthday, that he'd like would like to study abroad for a year, I immediately thought of Rotary. I was not a Rotarian, but just knew from life experience that they offered an excellent youth exchange experience. A call to Dryden Rotary charter member Kim Schenck confirmed that the club indeed participated in youth exchange, hosting a student every year. The club had only sponsored one student 10 years prior, but they were willing to sponsor Bryan.

Through Bryan's decision, I met not only local Rotarians, but the amazing folks on the district youth exchange committee. Seeing their level of investment in training and supporting our young people on their exchange year prompted more involvement in our local club. We arranged for Bryan to Skype into a meeting from India so that club members could hear about his exchange firsthand. Back in 2013, that was still in the land of technological wonders.

Our former neighbor heard about Bryan's experience and wanted to apply for youth exchange. Her mom asked me all sorts of questions about youth exchange. What I didn't know, I found out, and before long, I was on our local youth exchange committee. Since then, Dryden still routinely hosts students from around the world, as well as sending students out. This year Ainsely will spend a year in Spain and Sabina will spend a year in Taiwan.

Staying connected with the school and getting to know families in our community has both broadened and deepened my relationships in the community, connecting with people I would not otherwise have a chance to know. As a club, we have invested in dozens of students and their families, promoting the values of Rotary, promoting peace, one student at a time.

Mobile Pack

On Saturday, September 30, seven members of Ithaca Sunrise Rotary participated in the 2023 Ithaca Mobile Pack for Feed My Starving Children. During the two-hour session, we, along with five other individuals, packed 8 boxes containing 36 bags of dry food consisting of vitamins, dry veggies, dry soy, and uncooked rice. The whole assembly packed a total of 82 boxes, which translates into 17,712 meals that will feed 48 children per day for one year! Mobile Pack's cost per meal is 29¢ and \$106 will pay for a year's worth of meals for one child.



This is such a rewarding activity. And all the work is done, we just had to show up for a couple hours, receive some important instructions/reminders, and get to work! 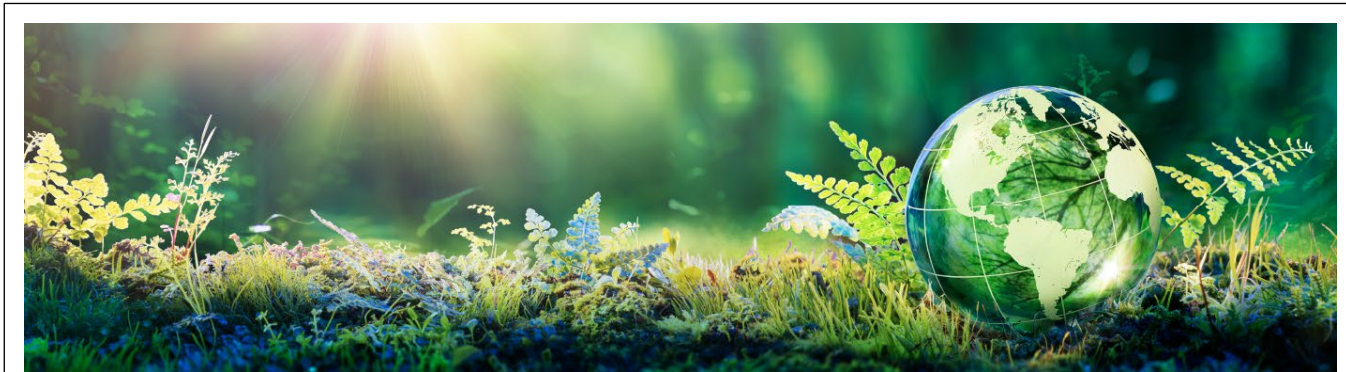

That’s because leaders don’t want to acknowledge “the elephant in the room,” said Ugandan climate activist Vanessa Nakate. “The elephant is that fossil fuels are responsible for the crisis. We can’t eat coal. We can’t drink oil, and we can’t have any new fossil fuel investments.”

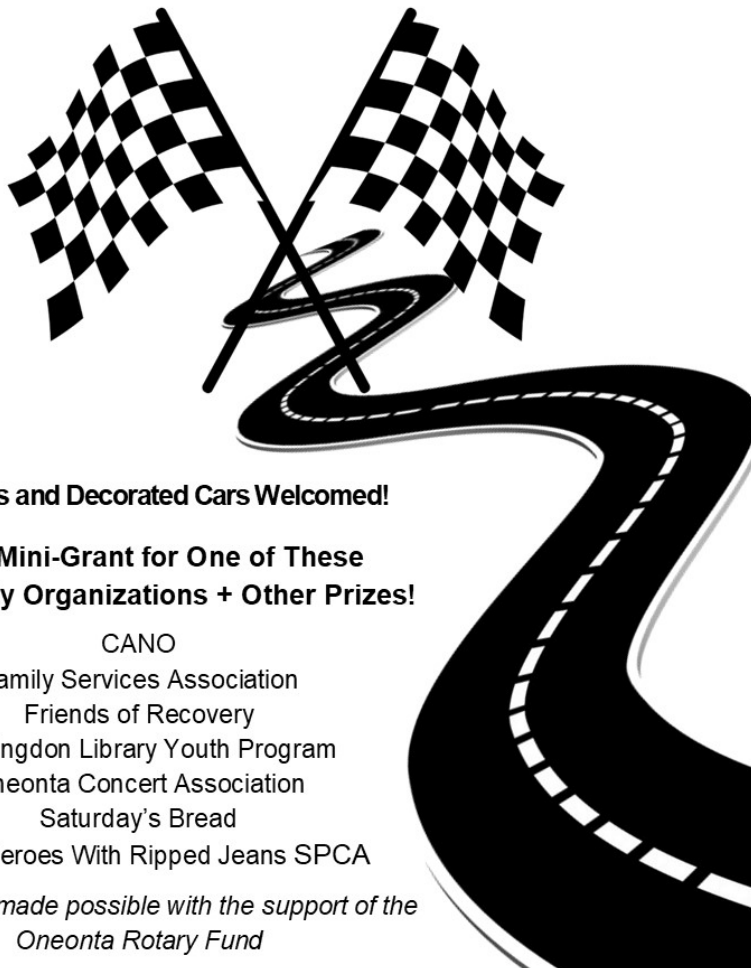
